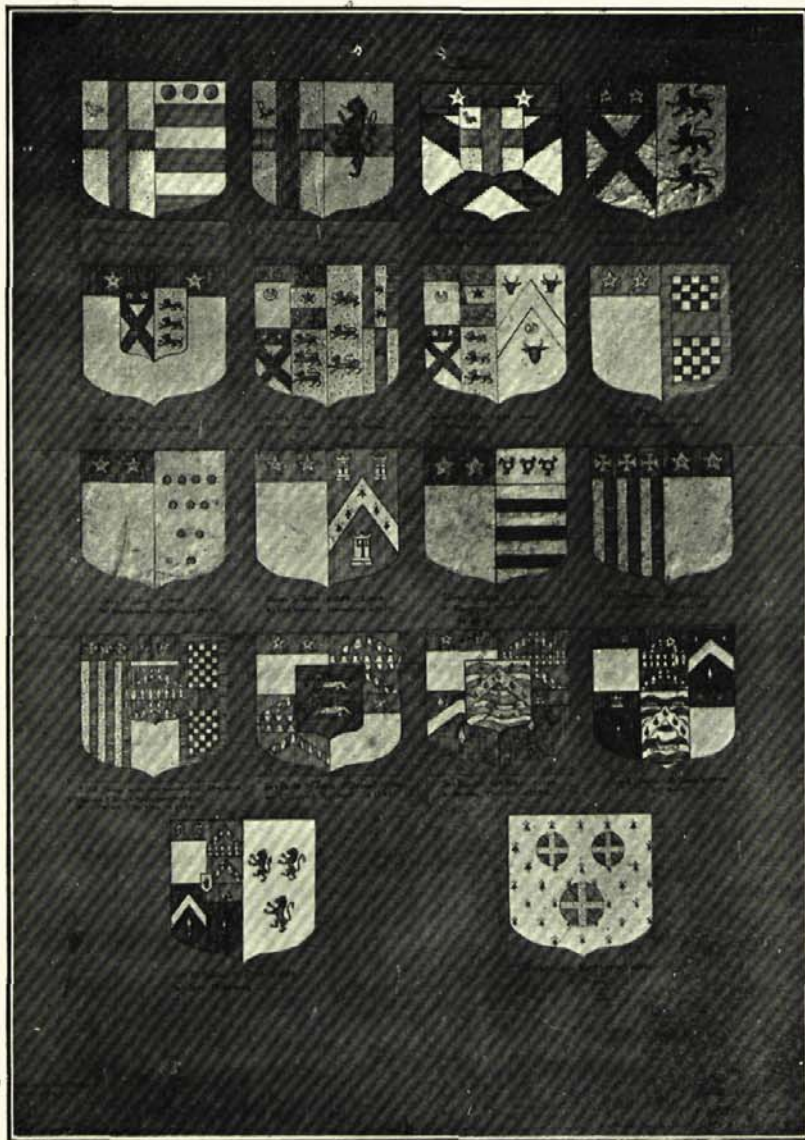


ARMS OF LORDS OF FARLEY

<p>I. Thomas de Missenden; lord 1346. Obüt 1369. Or, a cross engrailed gules in the dexter chief a Cornish chough. (p. 2).</p>	<p>Isabel Brocas. Born 1330. Sable a Lion rampant guardant, or.</p>
<p>II. Sir Bernard de Missenden. Obüt 1408.</p>	<p>Isabel, daughter and co-heir of John Frome.</p>
<p>III. Katherine de Missenden. Born 1405; died 1436, heiress of her father. Missenden in pretence on Idwardby.</p>	<p>John Idwardby. Argent a saltire, engrailed sable on a chief two mullets of the first.</p>
<p>IV. John Idwardby had the right to bear quarterly— 1st, Idwardby. 2nd, Missenden. 3rd, Frome. 4th, Idwardby. But only bore Idwardby.</p>	<p>Sanctia sister and co-heir of Nicholas Carew. Arms, or, three lioncels passant sable.</p>
<p>V. Joan Idwardby. She quartered 1st, Idwardby 2nd, Missenden. 3rd, Carew. After 1525.</p>	<p>Sir John St. John, 1473—1512. 1st argent on a chief gules two mullets, or. 2nd, Beauchamp gules on a fesse between six martlets or, a mullet pierced sable.</p>
<p>VI. Sir John St. John, 1505—1576. Quartered— 1st, St. John 2nd, Beauchamp. 3rd, Idwardby. 4th, Carew Married twice. Was succeeded at Farley by his son by his second wife, Elizabeth Whithill.</p>	<p>Margaret Carew. Impaled. Or; three lioncels passant sable (Carew) first wife. Elizabeth, daughter of Sir R. Whithill, of Salop (impaled). Per fesse azure and or. Over all a pale and three lions rampant. counter changed, two and one.</p>

<p>VII. William St. John, 1538—1609. Bears quarterly— 1st, St. John. 2nd, Beauchamp. 3rd, Idwardby. 3rd, Carew.</p>	<p>Barbara Gore (Gore of Wiltshire impaled). Or, three bulls' heads caboshed sable, a crescent on a crescent for difference.</p>
<p>VIII. Henry St. John, son and heir of William. Obüt 1621. He bare 1st, St. John 2nd, Beauchamp 3rd, Idwardby. 4th, Carew. 5th, St. John.</p>	<p>Ursula, daughter of Sir Hugh Stewkley, of Mersh, Somerset. Chequey, argent and sable. A fesse gules within a bordure azure.</p>
<p>IX. John St. John, 1603—1627. Succeeded 1621. Ditto.</p>	<p>Susanna, daughter of Richard Gifford, of Tytherley, Hants. Argent, ten torteaux, four three two one gules.</p>
<p>X. Oliver St. John, 1608—1665. Succeeded 1628. Ditto.</p>	<p>Constance, daughter of Walter Dawley, of Lainston, Hants. Or, two bends azure. (Dawley).</p>
<p>XI. Oliver St. John. Obüt 1689. Succeeded 1665. Ditto.</p>	<p>Margery, daughter and co-heiress of Francis Rivett. Argent, three bars sable, in chief as many trevets of the last. These arms in pretence on St. John's tomb.</p>
<p>XII. Ellis, son of Ellis Mewes, of Winchester, by Christian, daughter of Oliver St. John and Margaret Dawley. Christian Born 1644, married 1666, died 1680. Mewes bare Paley of six or and azure, on a chief gules, three crosses patees, or.</p>	<p>Frances, daughter of Oliver St. John and Margery Rivett, co-heir of her brother, Oliver, after May, 1699. Married Ellis Mewes (her cousin) 6th December, 1699, died S.P. 25th March, 1700. Mewes impaling St. John on her tomb at Farley.</p>
<p>XIII. Ellis Mewes succeeded to Farley December, 1700, in right of his mother, Christian, assumed the name and arms of St. John, 1701, 12th June, died 1728. Mewes impales Goodyer and Stewkley.</p>	<p>Martha, daughter and heir of John Goodyer, of Dogmersfield, married 1703, died 1725. Gules a fesse between three chevrons, vair, argent and azure. Ellis Mewes married thirdly Sarah, daughter of Sir Hugh Stewkley, of Michelmersh, Romsey. Arms—Chequey argent and sable, a fesse gules within a bordure azure.</p>

<p>XIV. Paulet St. John, 1704—1780, son of Ellis, succeeded 1728. Created a baronet. Married thrice. He quartered St. John and Goodyer and bare Rushout in pretence in 1730. Hatchments at Farley of Goodyer and Harris.</p>	<p>1st wife—Elizabeth, daughter and heiress of Sir James Rushout, Bt. Died 1st December, 1733. Sable, two lions passant guardant, or. 2nd wife—Mary, daughter and heir of John Waters, of Brecon, by his wife, Jane Lloyd, widow of Sir Haswell Tynte, Bt. Sable, a chevron between three spear heads argent (Waters). Sable, a spear head embued between three scaling ladders, two and one, argent. On a chief gules, a castle triple towered proper for Lloyd. 3rd wife—Jane, daughter and heir of Roger Harris, of Winchester. Argent, a chevron erminois between three hedgehogs, or.</p>
<p>XV. Sir Paulet St. John, second baronet, 1737—1784. He bore 1st, St. John. 2nd, Goodyer. 3rd, Waters. 4th, Lloyd. With Tucker in pretense. (See Hatchment).</p>	<p>Dorothy, daughter and co-heiress of Abraham Tucker, of Bletchworth Castle, Surrey. Died 1768. Barry wavey of ten argent and azure; a chevron embattled, or, between three sea horses naissant of the last five Guttee de Poix. Tucker.</p>
<p>XVI. Sir Henry Paulet St. John, 1764—1808. Succeeded 1784. Assumed the name of Mildmay. He bore— 1st, St. John. 2nd, Goodyer. 3rd, Waters. 4th, Lloyd. 6th, Tucker. 7th, St. John. He impaled Mildmay.</p>	
<p>XVII. Sir Henry Paulet St. John Mildmay, 1764—1808. 1st, St. John. 2nd, Goodyer. 3rd, Waters. 4th, Lloyd.</p>	<p>Jane, daughter and heiress of Carew Mildmay, of Shawford House, Hants. Died 6th May, 1857. Argent, three lions rampant (Mildmay).</p>
<p>XVIII. Sir William Heathcote, Bt., of Hursley Park, 1826—1881, purchased Farley. Ermine three pomeis, each charged with a cross, or.</p>
